1.0 Issue / Origin

The Supervisor of By-Law and Animal Services is responsible for preparing and presenting quarterly reports.

2.0 Background

Council has requested in each quarter a report on the activities of the By-Law and Animal Services Department, including the Township of Brock Dench Animal Shelter. This report represents the fourth quarter report (Q4) from October 1st to December 31st 2024. The statistics for the quarterly reports include, but are not limited to, emails, phone calls, and tracking software and programs used by the Department, FirePro (Bylaw) and Shelter Buddy (Animal Shelter).

3.0 Analysis

In the fourth quarter of 2024, the By-Law and Animal Services Department addressed a range of bylaw and animal-related incidents and investigations.

Despite high activity levels in previous quarters, the animal shelter experienced a decline in dog intakes and minimal wildlife-related calls in Q4. However, the intake of sick and injured cats and kittens rose significantly in both Q3 and Q4. Low adoption rates, driven by rising veterinary and pet care costs, resulted in longer stays for animals. Staff continue to promote adoptions and collaborate with partners to find homes for animals in care. Increased enforcement and educational efforts in parks contributed to a reduction in complaints about conflicts between dogs and people. Amendments to the Exotic Animal and Animal Control By-Laws in Q3 and Q4 provided additional enforcement tools, supporting animal welfare and responsible pet ownership.

The By-Law Division saw typical increases in property standards cases, including issues with overgrown lawns, dead trees, and general property maintenance. Some properties remained non-

compliant despite orders, requiring Township-led cleanups with costs added to property tax rolls. Landlord-tenant disputes increased notably, leading to charges, dispute resolution, and mediation. Zoning investigations focused on improper land use, unauthorized construction setbacks, and drainage issues. Parking enforcement patrols, including blitzes near schools and municipal lots, improved compliance and reduced violations. Noise and nuisance calls remained consistent, with successful mediation efforts and a few court charges, including one involving an industrial company.

The report also summarizes calls, emails, and inquiries related to by-law and animal control services, as well as activities such as veterinarian visits, animal transfers, and shelter visits for adoptions and claims. Charts 1-4 provide further data on communications, investigations, and licensing inspections.

There have been no significant budgetary concerns during the Q4 period. The animal shelter maintained a moderate to high volume of animals and service requests, contributing to sustained expenses for veterinary care, pet food and operational supplies. Budgetary allocations for By-Law enforcement and traffic control remained within anticipated levels. A large increase in revenue was noted in POA as a result of sending unpaid parking infractions to court and due to fines and charges issued under various Municipal By-Laws for non-compliance.
